I PREAMBLE

Indian Academy of Social Sciences (ISSA) in association with Mangalore University shall hold 39th session of Indian Social Science Congress (ISSC) from December 1-5, 2015 at Mangalore with a view to developing and disseminating science of Nature-Humans-Society in Indian context through appraisal and integration of current research and theories in all subjects of science including Philosophy and Humanities for enabling people of India to enjoy higher order of material, social and cultural life while living in peace and harmony with Nature. All university and college teachers, research students, research scientists working in Research Institutes and laboratories of DST, CSIR, ICMR, ICAR, ICSSR, ICHR, ICPR and other privately funded deemed universities and research institutes are cordially invited to participate in it. Policy planners, social activists and social thinkers having concern for science of Nature-Humans-Society too are cordially invited.

II FOCAL THEME

The Indian Academy of Social sciences and Mangalore University have resolved to focus deliberations of XXXIX Indian Social Science Congress on 'Emerging Interfaces of Social Science and Public Policy in India', which is an extension of the deliberations on 'Knowledge Systems, Scientific Temper and the Indian People,' held at XXXVIII Indian Social Science Congress in March 29-April 2, 2015, Andhra University, Visakhapatnam. A note on it prepared by National Academic Advisory Committee is given on pp 14-22. As is well known social science is used to denote basic character of scientific knowledge of Nature-Humans-Society and not the current divisions in science. All subjects of science and technology, therefore, fall under the phrase 'Social Science'. Also, the word 'Nature' today encompasses all that exists (non-living as well living) on, within, above, below and around the Planet Earth. Humans and Societies too are integral to Nature as old conceptions of Nature, Humans and Societies are no longer valid. It is in this sense that our scientists of all subjects are hereby invited to examine the interfaces of their subjects with other subjects and the necessity, relevance and validity of scientific knowledge produced by them to the Public Policy in India.

Major objectives are as follows:

- 1. To examine the interfaces of Social Science knowledge and its relevance and utilization for Public Policy India.
- 2. To discover and develop an integrated theory and method of Social Science/Science of Nature-Humans-Society.
- 3. To examine the scientific foundations of all public policies in Democratic Republic of India
- 4. To comprehend the connections between Social Science/Science of Nature-Humans-Society and Public Policy in India and elsewhere.
- 5. To analyse the differentials of Politics of Public Policy and Science of Public Policy.
- 6. To work out an appropriate scientific strategy for appropriate utilization of social science/science of Nature-Humans-Society for shaping/reshaping Public Policies having bearing on the wellbeing of the People of India in particular, and the people of the world in general.

III PLENARIES

It is proposed to hold 8 plenaries on the focal theme, 'Emerging Interfaces of Social Science and Public Policy in India' during the XXXIX Indian Social Science. There will be three eminent scholars representing three subjects making substantive presentation in each plenary and two discussants. Each plenary, therefore, will be multidisciplinary.

XII TASK FORCE

A Task Force constituted by the Executive Council shall deliberate upon deliberations of the XXXIX Indian Social Science Congress in post-dinner session in order to discover newer ideas, theories and methods having relevance to Science and Society and shall submit its report to the General Assembly of delegates on December 5, 2015 at 1430 hour for discussion and adoption.

XIII SUBMISSION OF PAPERS

Research or review-based papers by all those who are doing research in universities, colleges, research institutes of DST, CSIR, ICMR, ICSSR, ICHR, ICPR, AIIMs, PGIs, Medical and Health Science, universities and colleges, R&D organizations, etc are invited for presentation at XXXIX Indian Social Science Congress. Policy planners, social activists, social thinkers and public administrators too are welcome to submit their papers and participate in the Indian Social Science Congress. Industries too are welcome to present their thoughts and experience on public policy vis-à-vis indigenous Science and Technology.

All papers should be typed on A-4 size in 10 font. Maximum length of a paper can be 7000 words or 30 typed pages. Its abstract stating hypothesis, method and results should be within 500 words. Each paper is to be accompanied by a duly signed 'Declaration Form' given in the Annexure stating that the paper is based on the author's original works and has not been copied from any source and that it has neither been presented anywhere nor submitted for publication or presentation anywhere.

XIV MEDIUM

Hindi and English are the official language of Indian Social Science Congress. So papers can be submitted either in Hindi or in English. Papers in any other Indian language too can be submitted along with its translation in Hindi or English. ISSA wishes to have all Indian languages as the official medium of ISSC. However, it doesn't have the necessary resources for the same till date.

XV LAST DATES

Last dates for submission of papers are as follows:

- 1. Last date for submission of abstract of Papers: October 15, 2015
- 2. Last date for submission of full paper: November 02, 2015

Papers will be received even after the last date. But no paper shall be received after November 30, 2015. Papers received after November 02, 2015 shall be printed only after the XXXIX Indian Social Science Congress is over.

Dr. A.K. Tharien Gold Medal and Prof. B.V. Rangarao Gold Medal will be awarded for the best papers presented at XXXIX Indian Social Science Congress. However, these awards will be given at next Indian Social Science Congress.

One who is not a member but wishes to become member of the Indian Academy of Social Sciences can send the membership fee and the registration fee meant for member-delegate along with filled-in membership and registration forms.

An institution/organization can depute its three or more representatives to the Indian Social Science Congress. In the event of more than three representatives, the cost of registration for individual delegate (member or non-member) shall be payable by the concerned institution/organization.

Unregistered scholars attending XXXIX Indian Social Science Congress shall be required to buy the food coupon from the counter. No certificate shall be issued to unregistered scholars or scholars who have registered without submitting any papers. No one will be entitled to receive literature of XXXIX ISSC without registration.

A NOTE ON THE FOCAL THEME

EMERGING INTER-FACES OF SOCIAL SCIENCE AND PUBLIC POLICY IN INDIA

0100 PREAMBLE

Indian Academy of Social Sciences (ISSA) in association with Mangalore University shall focus the deliberations of XXXIX Indian Social Science Congress in December 1-5, 2015 on **Emerging Interfaces of Social Science and Public Policy in India** with a view to improving the scientific base of Public Policies capable of improving the quality of life of People of India, their socio-cultural relations and friendly relations with Nature.

0200 EMERGING INTER-FACES

The last few decades have seen a significant shift that has taken place in the manner of knowledge creation. This shift clearly indicates that there has been a narrowing of boundaries of disciplines and a greater amount of networking among sciences both in terms of theory and method with a view to solving significant human and social problems faced by the present day world and, also in preparing it better for the future. Indian scientists, though, still have to warm up to the idea of trans- disciplinarity in sciences. This is particularly true in social science research and teaching. Keeping this in view, the focus of the 39th Indian Social Science Congress will be to deliberate on taking stock of the social science knowledge that is getting created at the various inter-faces of social sciences and to consider how the same can be put to use in framing of public policy.

There is a perceptible divide between those who generate social science knowledge and makers of public policy in India. Very little social science knowledge has informed the formulation of public policy, except, some that has been generated by economists. It is also found that policies are reversed or changed without any sound reason. This clearly shows that public policies are either ideologically driven or are based on populism. They lack the foundational base that can be provided by the social science knowledge. Despite, a large number of policy initiatives that have been taken in the last sixty seven years to eradicate poverty and hunger, India continues to have the highest absolute number of poor and hungry. The country also tops in having the highest number of malnourished children in the world. Food security continues to stare us in the face. Infant mortality may have come down but it remains ten times higher compared to OECD average. It also has an unacceptable number of illiterates, particularly, women. India's record with respect to taking steps in relation to sustainable development and preservation of human environment is also nothing to shout about. Depletion of natural resources today is a big concern. Forest covers have rapidly dwindled and Himalayan glaciers have been continuously melting. Sanitation, hygiene and clean drinking water are of big concern throughout India. There is tall talk about the importance of development of the social sector, but the status of Education, both school and college level education is abysmal according to most reports. Public health too is in a very poor state. Although, India aspires to be counted among the powerful countries of the world, it faces challenges to keep the country integrated. There is unacceptable level of violence involving religious and ethnic groups along with political and gender violence. We have failed to ask some basic questions related to democracy, freedom, and equality, The policies of the governments are either absent or have failed because they are framed in the absence of requisite data and do not take into account the human and social sides of the problem. It is for this reason that problems which were there at the time of independence, such as, of poverty and unemployment, illiteracy, health, social exclusion, communalism and violence, gender inequality etc., are still looming large. High population growth rate is put forward as a reason for India's problem but it explains such problems only partially. It is also surprising that the Government of India does not show the same concern with its rising population as it once did.

Indian Academy of Social Sciences (ISSA), therefore, calls upon our scientists of all subjects to take a fresh look at the new knowledge that is getting created within social sciences and knowledge which is being created at the emerging inter-faces between social and human, natural and biological sciences; similarly also, between social sciences and technologies. It would like to consider how such knowledge is qualitatively different from intra-disciplinary knowledge and how it can feed into informing and in framing of the public policies. It is also suggested that we may also deliberate on politics of knowledge used by scientists, policy makers, and those who are given the responsibility to translate it on the ground. It expects that such deliberations will draw not only from statistical data and knowledge generated by empirical studies but also from theories within and across disciplines. It further expects that the deliberations will raise substantive issues which can contribute in the formulation of alternative paradigms of development and of improving the quality of life of the Indian people. ISSA also hopes that the deliberations will

enable us to make recommendations about the facilitative public policies that can bring about development of India's human, social, political and moral capital. A positive fall out of such deliberations may be a demand for radical restructuring of social sciences which, at present are divided by narrow boundaries, and, are mostly in the service of their political and corporate masters. ISSA expects that the deliberations of the Social Science Congress will prepare social scientists to harness knowledge emerging at the various inter-faces of science to develop a futures programme in order to prepare humankind for dealing effectively with humanitarian crises that are almost imminent.

The Programme of the 39th Indian Social Science Congress will consist of symposia organized by different research committees around this theme. Plenary lectures on the theme will be given by invited speakers. We also expect various Research Committees to focus on the emerging inter-faces in their research discipline and to deliberate on what new knowledge has gotten created which can be put to use to improve the quality of lives of humans and also to save our green planet from ruination. Some of the major issues that the 39th ISSC will like to focus upon are given below. Our attempt will be to understand the role that is played, and can be possibly played, by institutional, economic, political, social, cultural and psychological factors in designing of public policies and interventions. The issues that get raised in this connection are-

- (i) Where and how conventional policies fall short? Why are rational choices so difficult to make?
- (ii) How can trans-disciplinary research be used to bridge the gap between science and policy? What can
- (iii) be done to develop interacting policy cultures?
- (iv) How can we better understand the use of scarce natural resources and global change; the role that is
- (v) played by institutional, political, social, cultural and psychological factors in the use of different sources of renewable energy and natural resources?
- (vi) How can we better manage geo-hazards (e.g., earthquakes, floods, tsunamis, landslides and other disasters)?
- (vii) Based on integrated and multidisciplinary research what new issues related to physical and mental
- (viii) health are raised and what new public health policy needs to be put in place?
- (ix) What is our understanding related to global and local conflict and violence? What new strategies of
- (x) peace building can be considered?
- (xi) What are the emerging challenges of educational development, knowledge creation and development of human potential in the digital age in developing societies, particularly in India?
- (xii) How can we address issues related to erosion of values and ethics and raise overall moral, emotional, and social capitals of communities?
- (xiii) What new knowledge is available in relation to inequalities and exclusion? How can it be used to enhance social justice?
- (xiv) What has been the impact of new media on society and in bringing about social, political and cultural change?
- (xv) What structural conditions keep the humankind un-free? How can its overall freedom be enhanced? As has been the practice, a Task Force will be entrusted with the responsibility to develop actionable steps that can be taken by the scientists, civil society and the state to bring about desirable changes at different levels.

0300 PUBLIC POLICY

Any scientific inquiry into Public Policy and its effects raises hosts of questions. What does public policy mean? Who makes public policy how, for what and for whom? What is the connection between politics and public policy? What is the connection between peoples needs of survival, growth and the public policy? Is there scientific social theory behind every public policy? Has public policy enabled modern people of India to overcome their problems of hunger, poverty, undernourishment/ malnourished, unemployment, education, health, livelihood, conflicts and violence, discrimination and disparities etc. etc. How has science/social science influenced Public Policy? All these and many more questions ought to be addressed while trying to comprehend the scientific foundation of public policy and evolve appropriate strategy for appropriate strategy for utilization of scientific knowledge for improving formulation and effectiveness of Public Policy. While doing so one also ought to keep the historicity of public policy in view. For instance, public policy in British India and public policy in Democratic Republic of India may not mean the same and may have mutuality opposite goals.

Public policy by the British Government in India as is well known was designed to serve the British interest of plunder, loot, exploitation. This cannot be and ought not be so in Democratic Republic of India.

The word 'public' in 'public policy', though ambiguous, is very attractive as it seem to refer to all those of a given society/country/nation. In science it is well known that every modern society/country/nation has diverse groups of peoples forming ethnic, caste, class, creed, language and regional divisions. This is well reflected in

several public polices in Democratic Republic of India. For instance, policies for scheduled castes, scheduled Tribes, Backward caste/class, women, etc.

'Policy' means an approach to or strategy for seeking solution of the given problem. Public policy, therefore, means a statement outlining approach to specific or general problem of the people and seeking its solution within the shortest period of time. This meaning will change with change in nature of problems and nature of State.

In democracy, the character of public policy, one would expect, is rooted in democratic principles of sovereignty, equality, freedom and fraternity. Peoples being sovereigns in Democratic Polity, would be expected to formulate their policies of social existence and development in harmony with Nature. Question to ponder is: Do people of India formulate and act upon so-called public policies? If not, the character of Public Policy may turn out to be authoritarian with little connection with the peoples needs. If so, the public policy may have double meaning. Apparently it may mean one thing and in reality it may have a different agenda. For example, the Government of Democratic Republic of India under the Prime Minister of Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru launched Five-Year Plan in 1951 with a promise to remove the British-Born poverty, unemployment, exploitation, etc through distribution of wealth and land and by ensuring that rich shall not become richer and poor shall not become poorer henceforth. Parliament passed a scientific policy resolution 1958 assigning this role to scientists. Results of the Two Five Year Plans, however, did not confirm Nehru's promise. Rich became richer and poor went on becoming poorer. This went on despite MRTPC Act and several other policy injections. Today Indian elite is proud of producing 102 or 103 billionaires at the cost of nearly 100 crores hungry, poor and unemployed Indians. Contrary to the public pronouncement of 'Land to the Tiller and 'Dhan aur Dharti Bant Ke Rahegi' (Wealth and Land shall be distributed) British Land and Forest Laws of 1892 were retained and are all still being hotly pursued by the Democratic Governments in India. Similarly, all public policies for removal of unemployment, poverty, hunger, illiteracy, disease and injustice ended up by increasing the same. Question is: Why?

0500 SUB-THEMES OF RESEARCH COMMITTEES

There are 19 Research Committees representing 32 subjects of the Indian Social Science Congress. Since everything is related to every other thing, all these Research Committees too are inter-related with each other and their traditionally demarcated boundaries do not seem to hold them apart from each other. Scientific knowledge generated by all these when put together seem to offer better understanding and solution of problems of Nature-Humans-Society relationship and, hence if used appropriately better public policy can be formulated and implemented. Keeping this in view each of the 19 Research Committees, it is hoped, shall deliberate upon the Public policy from the point of view of their current research and theory with a view to working out better science-based Public Policy. INDIAN ACADEMY OF SOCIAL SCIENCES

The Indian Academy of Social Sciences (ISSA when abbreviated) is the first National Science Academy of independent Democratic Republic of India and fourth in chronicle order. The other three national science Academies—Indian National Science Academy (INSA), Indian Academy of Sciences (IAS) and National Science Academy of India (NSAI) were born in British India. ISSA was born, 40 years ago, on August 15, 1974 at University of Allahabad in an assembly of young scientists. August 15, 1974 symbolized a beginning of an altogether new science reflecting democratic needs, aspirations, creative urges / potentialities, history, culture and traditions of peoples of India. Its name was carefully chosen for reflecting the true meaning and function of science. The setting up of the Indian Academy of Social Sciences also heralded a beginning of a new movement for unity of science of Nature-Humans-Society by forging unity among all branches of science. Many described it as a barometer of science and society in India. In more than one sense ISSA is a unique body in the whole world.

Science means objective knowledge of non-living and living things / objects and knowledge means answer to questions 'what', 'how' and 'why', about a thing / object. The word 'Nature' connotes all forms of objects / things / matter including humans and societies. Nature-Humans-Society form one single continuum. So division of science into physics, chemistry, biology, environment, ecology, agriculture, medical, social, historical etc. is artificial and all such divisions provide partial objective knowledge of Nature-Humans-Society. Unity of Science of Nature-Humans-Society, therefore, is necessary for having correct and full understanding of Nature. Science, thus viewed is unitary as well as uniting.

The Science as an objective knowledge of non-living and living objects / things / matter is produced through collective mental and physical labour of men and women. What is the result of collective labour is termed as **social** and what is **social is public and not private**. Science, therefore, is **social**. It springs in society comprising men and women. **Because it is social it has social functions**. It has the prime role in enabling men and women to enjoy higher quality of material, social and cultural life in harmony with Nature. However, all such social functions of science filter through different groups in the society because of which one doesn't find one-to-one relationship between science and conditions of all men and women of all societies. Humans' inability to create a science-based society is well reflected in modern societies all over the world.

The Indian Academy of Social Sciences seeks to discover, develop and disseminate science of Nature-Humans-Society in Indian conditions in particular, and world conditions in general, with a mission to build a new Democratic Republic of India where there is no hunger, no poverty, no unemployment, no illiteracy, no disease, no bigotry, no superstitions, no communalism, no casteism and no discrimination of any form and where all men, women and children enjoy equally good quality of material, social, cultural and spiritual life in harmony with Nature without any kind of fear of violence, rape and murder.

Founders of the Indian Academy of Social Sciences thought that science can benefit the peoples of a given society only when it is taught and researched in their own language. Communication of scientific research and science education in peoples own language, therefore, is key to the unfolding of creative potentialities of peoples and benefiting them. Unfortunately, even after 68 years of independence science in India is communicated through English. The end result is peoples of India who fund all scientific research are deprived of its benefits. The creativity in science is continuously declining. The Indian Academy of Social Sciences, therefore, seeks to change it by creating necessary conditions for communication of scientific research and science education in Indian languages involving publication of research journals, monographs, books etc. in Indian languages.



भारतीय समाज विज्ञान अकादमी

भारतीय समाज विज्ञान अकादमी स्वतंत्र भारत की प्रथम राष्ट्रीय विज्ञान अकादमी है। ऐतिहासिक दृष्टि से यह चौथी राष्ट्रीय विज्ञान अकादमी है। अन्य तीन राष्ट्रीय विज्ञान अकादमी, भारतीय राष्ट्रीय विज्ञान अकादमी, भारतीय विज्ञान अकादमी और राष्ट्रीय विज्ञान अकादमी की स्थापना ब्रिटिष शासन काल में हुई थी। इकतालीस साल पूर्व, 15 अगस्त 1974 में इलाहाबाद विश्वविद्यालय में भारतीय समाज विज्ञान अकादमी का जन्म हुआ। तत्कालीन युवाविज्ञानियों का एक नये राष्ट्रीय विज्ञान अकादमी की रचना करने का दृढ़ संकल्प भारतीय समाज विज्ञान अकादमी को स्थापित करने एवं साकार बनाने के पीछे था। भारतीय समाज विज्ञान अकादमी स्वतंत्र भारत में बिल्कुल एक नए विज्ञान का द्योतक है; उस विज्ञान का जिसमें भारतीय जनमानस की लोकतांत्रिक आवश्यकताएँ, महत्वाकांक्षा, संरचनात्मक क्षमता /प्रवृत्ति, इतिहास, परम्परा एवं संस्कृति परिलक्षित होती हो तथा जिसमें विज्ञान की सभी शाखाओं का संगम एवं समागम हो। इसकी स्थापना प्रकृति—मनुष्य—समाज के विज्ञान की एकता की नयी प्रक्रिया की शुरूआत का प्रतीक है। विज्ञान की सभी शाखाओं के बीच पारस्परिक सम्बन्ध एवं एकता स्थापित करना इस आन्दोलन का परम लक्ष्य है।

विज्ञान का अर्थ है निर्जीव एवं सजीव वस्तुओं / चीजों / पदार्थों के बारें में 'वस्तुनिष्ठ' ज्ञान, और ज्ञान का अर्थ है किसी भी वस्तु / चीज / पदार्थ के बारें में 'क्या', 'कैसे' एवं 'क्यों' का उत्तर। आधुनिक विज्ञान में 'प्रकृति' में सभी निर्जीव एवं सजीव पदार्थ सम्मिलित है। मनुष्य एवं समाज प्रकृति के अभिन्न अंग हैं। अतएव प्रकृति—मनुष्य—समाज को एकाकी विज्ञान की आवश्यकता है। इसलिए भौतिक विज्ञान, रसायन विज्ञान, जीव विज्ञान, जन्तु विज्ञान, पर्यावरण विज्ञान, कृषि विज्ञान, समाज विज्ञान आदि एक दूसरे से जुड़े हैं और उनमें पारस्परिक एकता के वगैर 'प्रकृति—मनुष्य—समाज' का एकाकी विज्ञान संभव नहीं है।

वस्तुनिष्ठ ज्ञान के रूप में विज्ञान सामूहिक मानसिक एवं शारीरिक श्रम की उपज है। यह बात तब और स्पष्ट हो जाती है जब हम इस बात पर ध्यान देते हैं कि आधुनिक विज्ञान अत्यधिक संगठित है। जो कुछ सामूहिक श्रम से उपजता है उसे समाज कहा जाता है। अतएवं विज्ञान का मूल स्वभाव समाजिक है। जो समाजिक है वह सार्वजिनक है या सभी के लिए है। इसमें 'निजी' का कोई स्थान नहीं है। अतएंव विज्ञान का कार्य भी समाजिक है। विज्ञान से सभी की भलाई सम्भव है।

इस प्रकार से 'समाज विज्ञान' में सभी विज्ञान की शाखायें मिलती हैं और एक नयी इकाई को जन्म देती है। भारतीय समाज विज्ञान अकादमी इस विज्ञान की नयी अवधारणा पर खड़ी है।

भारत की ठोस धरती पर 'प्रकृति—मनुष्य—समाज' के इस नये विज्ञान को खोजना, विकसित करना एवं प्रसारित करना भारतीय समाज विज्ञान अकादमी का लक्ष्य है। इस नये विज्ञान के द्वारा एक ऐसे नये भारत का निर्माण संभव है जिसमें कोई भूखा—नंगा, गरीब, बेरोजगार, अनपढ़, रोगी, घर—विहीन न हो, जिसमें लूट—पाट, मार—पीट, बलात्कार, हिंसा आदि का नामोनिशान न हो और जहां सभी भारतीय अच्छा भौतिक, आर्थिक, समाजिक एवं

सांस्कृतिक जीवन यापन करते हों और जहां प्रकृति, मनुष्य एवं समाज के बीच भ्रातृत्व एवं मित्रता के सम्बन्ध हो।

भारतीय समाज विज्ञान अकादमी के संस्थापकों का यह दृढ़ विश्वास था कि भारत में विज्ञान भारतीय लोगों के काम तभी आ सकता है जब भारत में विज्ञान भारतीय भाषा में हो। जब तक विज्ञान का संचार अंगेजी भाषा के द्वारा होगा तब तक न तो भारतीय लोगों की वैज्ञानिक संरचनात्मक क्षमता बढ़ेगी और न ही भारतीय लोगों की भलाई होगी। इसलिए भारतीय समाज विज्ञान अकादमी ने भारतीय भाषा में अनुसंधान एवं प्रशिक्षण के लिए अनुसंधान पत्रिकाओं, किताबों, आदि का प्रकाशित करने का लक्ष्य बनाया।

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
